## City Receives Distinguished Budget Presentation Award

The Government Finance Officers Association awarded the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award to the City of Lake Forest Park for its 2017-2018 biennial budget.

The award reflects the City's commitment to meeting the highest principles in governmental budgeting. To receive the award, the City must publish a budget document that meets program criteria

as a policy document, operations guide, financial plan, and communications tool. The new budget document was created by staff to provide transparent, meaningful budget information to our taxpayers.

## Council Maximizes Lake Forest Park's Influence

*Did you know...* in a county of approximately 2.1 million people and 39 cities and towns, your City Council extends the reach and influence of our community by serving on a number of regional boards? With issues ranging from water quality and conservation to transit, economic development and human services, these appointments give members of the Council a chance to make our local voice heard on a larger stage.

Having a City Council that is involved in this way benefits Lake Forest Park citizens by giving the City a seat at the regional tables and the ability to advocate for local needs. At the beginning of each year, the Council makes appointments to represent the City on these regional bodies:

## Environmental Grant Awarded to LFP

King County awarded the City \$70,000 in WaterWorks funding to develop an urban stream recovery pilot program and update its tree canopy study. Funds will be distributed to projects that seek to improve water quality, enhance fish passage, and better understand the density of the City's tree canopy.

*Urban Stream Recovery, \$40,000* Develops improved process for streamside residents to remove barriers to fish passage or enhance the stream on their properties. Streamside property owners with known barriers to fish passage on their properties will be contacted by the City over the next few months to encourage them to participate in the pilot program.

*Tree Canopy Study, \$30,000* Updates the 2009 baseline tree canopy survey following this year's tree regulations updates.

## Historic Photo Murals @ King County Bus Shelters

Last summer, the City was asked by King County Metro to participate in a joint project to install historic photo murals in bus shelters within Lake Forest Park. This summer, Metro crews installed murals in six shelters. Photos are from the early 1900s through the 1960s and show early life and landmark locations in the City. Examples include the groundbreaking ceremony for the first Town Hall, LFP's first one-room school, Tolt Pipeline and reservoir construction, Wurdemann & Rion Estates from Lake Washington, and more!

## September is National Preparedness Month

Since it began in 2004, National Preparedness Month is observed each September. Sponsored by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), National Preparedness Month encourages all of us to take steps to prepare for emergencies in our homes, businesses, schools, and communities. FEMA's Ready Campaign, has a lot of information to help the public prepare for and respond to emergencies, including natural disasters and potential terrorist attacks. Check it out at

Locally, Kenmore and Lake Forest Park partner with Northshore Fire Department and Northshore Utility District to form the Northshore Emergency Management Coalition (NEMCo). Each year, NEMCo provides at least two Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Academies. CERT is designed to provide training in basic disaster response skills, with the intent of organizing a group of volunteers that can supplement existing emergency responders in the event of a major disaster. ## Update on Safe Streets & Safe Highways

The *Safe Streets* study was adopted by the City Council in July and creates the framework for capital improvement safety projects moving forward. Safety needs, and projects to meet them, are identified and ranked in order of importance. The resulting project list helps staff direct efforts toward priority projects and organize grant funding strategies.

The *Safe Highways* study continues, with the formation of technical advisory committees and public outreach tasks. Guiding principles for the study were also adopted. City staff has been meeting with stakeholders, including representatives of Sound Transit 3, in order to align City efforts with regional strategies already underway. ## Don't Leaf it to Chance: Storm Drains & Flooding

While fall leaves are pretty, they work against the City's storm drain system. The City works to keep drains clear, but with close to 1,800 in town, we could use your help.

Do not remove the grates from the drains, as this creates a hazard and does not unclog the system. Instead, rake or blow leaves away from the drain (not into the street). Never try to clear a storm drain or culvert if there is moving water greater than knee deep, and always be wary of traffic when working near a roadway. Wet leaves are surprisingly heavy, so be careful not to overexert yourself.

Debris from storm drains should be placed in yard waste containers. If flooding is severe, or you find evidence of dumping, please call 206-368-5440.
