It's hard to believe the school year is right around the corner. With September comes an increase in traffic near our two elementary schools. Please be even more vigilant to your surroundings and attentive to your driving behavior on the roads.

We have a lot going on in our traffic safety program. The safety program near Brookside Elementary has

been a stellar success and speeds in the area have been reduced by more than 10 MPH. The Administration is in the process of creating a similar program near LFP Elementary both on 35th Ave NE and 40th Pl NE, subject to Council approval.

Also under consideration are installations of new crosswalks on Ballinger Way, NE 178th St and also the addition of Speed Safety cameras on State Routes 522 and 104. Speed Safety cameras will also be evaluated for installation on NE 197th St near Horizon View Park and on Brookside Boulevard near Animal Acres.

Under state law, all net revenue generated by Traffic Safety cameras is invested in road safety improvements for pedestrians and cyclists.

Please be thoughtful on all our roads - our kids and families depend on it.

Police and Public Safety Levy to Appear on November Ballot

Lake Forest Park residents will vote this fall on a proposed six-year police and public safety levy. The City Council has approved placing the measure on the November 2025 general election ballot to help fund essential services that support community safety.

If approved, the levy would fund police staffing and training, 911 dispatch, jail and court services, and mental health diversion and crisis intervention programs.

The proposed rate is \$0.24 per \$1,000 of assessed

property value and would appear on tax bills beginning in 2026. It would remain in effect for six years and include annual inflation adjustments, capped at five percent.

Like many cities in the region, Lake Forest Park is facing rising costs for police operations and regional services. These challenges are compounded by a 24% increase in inflation over the past four years and a state law that limits property tax revenue growth to just 1% per year.

To preserve service levels in the current budget, the City relied on one-time funds and made more than \$455,000 in spending reductions. While helpful in the short term, these measures are not a lasting solution.

It's Salmon SEEson in Lake Forest Park!

From August through November, Lake Forest Park enjoys a special time of year as our beloved salmon return from years of exploring the Pacific Ocean to the creeks and streams where they were born.

Each year, salmon make their way back to McAleer and Lyon Creeks, along with their tributaries, to build redds (gravel nests for salmon eggs), spawn, and eventually complete their life cycle in the same waters where their journeys began.

You can spot returning salmon this fall at Lyon Creek Waterfront Preserve, Blue Heron Park, and Pfingst Animal Acres Park. Keep an eye out for them throughout the season or stay tuned for details about our upcoming guided Salmon SEEson event, where a local salmon expert will share insights about the salmon's lifecycle, the threats they face from stormwater pollution, and ways residents can help protect this vital species.

A Cleaner Car Shouldn't Mean Dirtier Water


As the sunny days of summer wind down, many Lake Forest Park residents may still be catching up on outdoor chores, including washing their vehicles at home. While it's great to keep your car looking clean, it's important to do so in a way that protects our environment.

While keeping your car shiny and clean is a good thing, washing it in your driveway or on a public street is not. Wastewater from car washing is a form of pollution and allowing it to enter a city storm drain is not permitted in Lake Forest Park.

All of our city's storm drains connect to a stream or lake, which eventually flows into the Puget Sound. The storm drain system does not treat this water - it carries the pollution downstream as runoff. Runoff like this is the single largest source of pollutants entering the Puget Sound.

Any release of car wash wastewater to the city's storm drain system is considered an illicit discharge and does not comply with City Code.




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LFP Early Registration for Fall Recreation Programs with the City of Shoreline Begins August 21



Live in Lake Forest Park? Interested in recreation? Take advantage of recreation programs offered through the City of Shoreline! Lake Forest Park residents receive a 24-hour early registration window before each season's programs open to the public, along with an 8% discount on all program fees year-round (excluding rentals). Fall early registration begins on August 21 at 8:00 a.m. — even if you miss the early window, the discount still applies all year long.

To receive notices of the early registration dates, sign up for reminders through the City's website, Facebook, Instagram or keep watch on the City of Shoreline's website at www.shorelinewa.gov/recreation.
